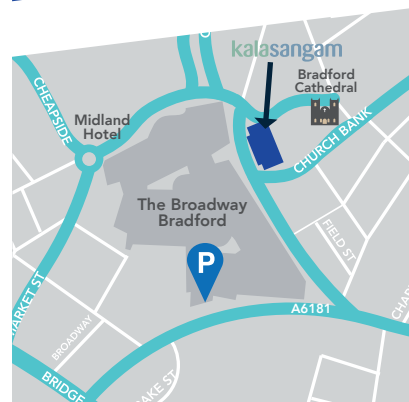
How to find us

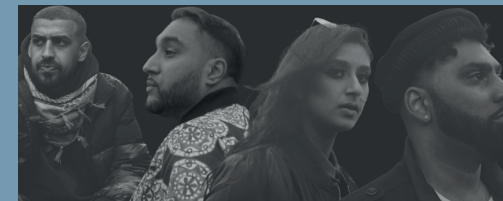
Arts Iftar
